Eight Nations Junior International-Bergamo-14/15 April.

The England and Wales Junior Team met at Loughborough together with the Green Shield Youth Squad for a few days training before we left for Italy on the 11th.of April. The first day at the College we only covered 6,000 yds but the next two days we covered a distance between 11 and 13,000 yds.in two 1½hour sessions. When we weren't in the pool we were in the gym, and in the evening the whole squad of around 50 got together for talks.

The coach journey to Heathrow saw encounter every mishap possible, and when we arrived at the Airport the plane was waiting for its cargo to arrive! From Milan we took a train to Bergamo and we found ourselves accommodated at a College with all the other teams. The College had facilities even sports centres would be envious of - gyms, volleyball, tennis and squash courts, rooms for jude and karate - in fact practically everything. The food was also very good, almost

anything we wanted and as much of it as we liked !

After a few days acclimatisation the competition began, and the pool (about 5 minutes walk from the College) was very modern and packed in about 2,000 spectators, On the first night, due to a disqualification, the England team were in third position behind the Dutch and Germans, but after the Girls 200 IM we regained second place behind the Dutch. They had some fantastic girl swimmers and a few excellent boys, and their few swimmers swam practically every event and gained maximum points in many of them. The English victories came from Dean Smith and Brian Lonsdale, and we also won my event - the 4x200 F/S Relay. My time of 2,05.9 equates to my best, and this proved to be the only relay win for the team.

The teams celebrated afterwards with a Disco at which there was plenty of free beer and wine. We were in bed at 1.00 a.m. and up again at 6.00 a.m. to catch the return flight back to London after 5 successful days in Italy. N.G.

The Final Gala of the London Swimming League was held at Ladywell Baths,
